

COVID-19 in Uxbridge

The graphs below shows the **total** number of confirmed COVID-19 cases in Uxbridge (not the number of cases each day). It is important to note that these are only cases that have been confirmed by PCR testing at an approved lab.




Resurgence vs. Second Wave

As states are beginning to return to "normal", cases of COVID-19 have begun to increase again. Some states, like Florida, look like they are experiencing a second wave of the pandemic. Other states, such as MA, are seeing a steady decline. So, are we already seeing the second wave of COVID-19 in the US? According to Anthony Fauci and other infectious disease epidemiologists, the answer is no. Caser rates have been decreasing over the past month, but there were still new cases occurring. A second wave of the virus will only come after we have experienced **NO** community spread of the virus for at least a week; in other words, after the first wave is over.

Instead, the cases in the U.S. have continued to go through small spikes, even while the number of cases was declining nationally. These spikes represent an increase in cases in states such as Florida and represent regional differences.

On a hopeful note, this means that there is still time to prevent a second wave; According to Dr. Fauci, "It is not inevitable that you will have a so-called 'second

wave' in the fall or even a massive increase if you approach it in the proper way". If you want to see more information on case counts, hospital rates, and state-specific trends, check out Johns Hopkins' COVID database.

Masks are still in style!

A reminder that mask wearing is most effective when everyone uses them. The combination of wearing a mask, proper social distancing procedures, quarantine, and hand hygiene has the potential to significantly minimize the spread of COVID-19. Masks are most effective at stopping droplets breathed out by a person who has COVID19, but can also protect those wearing a mask from inhaling droplets themselves. The spread of COVID-19 from those without symptoms is responsible for about 40% of all viral transmissions. Wearing a mask is not only for your own safety, but the safety of others and is good for everyone. A recent study that examined how useful mask wearing has been during the COVID 19 pandemic found that wearing masks is the most effective way to prevent transmission, although some scientists have <u>pushed back</u> on some of the assumptions made in the article.

What Happened to Regular Health Care?

Phase 2 of the reopening plan began on June 8 and health care practices are responding with appropriate caution. The experience with telehealth has changed primary health care and each practice is maximizing this type of "visit". If telehealth is not appropriate, in-person visits are prioritized, with emphasis being given to preventative and pediatric care, immunizations and urgent visits which would lead to further illness.

Taking care of your health has always been important. During this pandemic it is even more so. Practices have adapted to COVID-19 and it is safe to be seen, as long as familiar masking and hygiene measures are followed by both you and your health care provider.
