

## **Guidelines for Gravestone Rubbings**

- 1. Ask permission of the owner, caretaker or abutter of cemetery, to make a rubbing of a stone.
- 2. Limit gravestone rubbing to sound stones only. If stone is fragile or unstable, choose another stone.
- 3. Do not remove lichen or moss. Do not wash or brush stones with anything.
- 4. The best choice of stones for rubbing are slate stones in good condition with low-relief or incised carvings. These produce the best images on paper and are less easily damaged inadvertently.
- 5. Avoid rubbing deeply carved stones. Such stones can be easily damaged and generally do not make good rubbings anyway
- 6. Avoid rubbing marble or other stones with coarse, grained textures, as coloring agents may bleed or cut through the paper onto the stones.
- 7. Use a heavy grade paper and wrap it completely around the stone and secure it to itself (not the stone) with masking tape only.
- 8. Use a dark crayon or chalk and rub lightly in one direction so as not to tear the paper. Do not make any marks on the stone itself.
- 9. Be sure and remove all bits of tape, paper or trash from the area before leaving.
